## FEDERAL/STATE PARTNERSHIP •

Federal/State Partnership is the collaborative effort of NEH and fifty-six state and territorial humanities councils. The goals of the state humanities councils reflect NEH's mission to promote knowledge of human history, thought, and culture and to enhance the role of the humanities throughout the nation. The partnership is developed to help the Endowment realize its strategic goals of increasing public awareness of, access to, and participation in the humanities and to strengthen humanities teaching and learning in schools and colleges across the nation. The partnership is a significant aspect of NEH's efforts to make public humanities education and life-long learning readily available at the local level, tailored to state and local interests and needs.

Humanities councils operate in all fifty states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, the U.S. Virgin Islands, Guam, the Commonwealth of the Northern

Mariana Islands, and Amerika Samoa. Federal/State Partnership makes annual operating support grants to councils to fund locally developed programs and to design and conduct humanities initiatives. The councils' effectiveness in serving the public is seen in their collective success in attracting contributions well in excess of the 1:1 match required by NEH's legislation. In Fiscal Year 2004, in addition to significant in-kind gifts of support, councils received more than \$27 million beyond their NEH general operating support grants. Of this, \$9.2 million came from state

legislatures and more than \$8.7 million from foundations, corporations, and individual donors. Councils also received \$2.2 million in other federal funding.

In 2004, councils supported thousands of programs that reached millions of Americans. Fifty-two councils sponsored K-12 teacher projects, reaching 1.5 million educators; thirty-six councils sponsored literacy programs that drew more

than 150,740 participants; 1.5 million people gathered for book discussions; and more than 3.5 million participated in cultural tourism, preservation, and local history projects. State council-funded exhibitions attracted almost eight million visitors, while media projects had audiences of approximately 127 million. Finally, nearly twelve million students participated in state council-funded projects.

More than three decades of public programming experience have helped councils implement NEH's *We the People* initiative, emphasizing democratic principles, civic history, and community leadership. With strong networks among cultural and educational institutions, and use of diverse media, councils reinforce the importance of the American experience by providing their own resources for the initiative and by encouraging participation in NEH's programs.

In 2004, each of the fifty-six councils received NEH special funding to support designated *We the People* projects. *We the People* programs focused on American history and democracy and included expanded Chautauqua programming; commemorations of the fiftieth anniversary of *Brown v. Board of Education* and of the bicentennial of the Lewis and Clark Corps of Discovery; and a teacher institute on Congress and American History, sponsored jointly by Humanities Texas, the University of Texas at Austin, the Lyndon Baines Johnson Library and Museum, the National Archives and Records Administration, and the Center for American History.

State humanities councils are noted for bringing the humanities to the public on a large scale, sometimes embracing populations of entire towns, cities, or regions. In 2009, Alaska will celebrate fifty years of statehood. In preparation for this occasion, the Alaska Humanities Forum has developed a concentrated five-year study of "Alaska's March to Statehood"—the story of how a vast, trackless territory with a diverse and determined population joined the United States. The education and outreach efforts of the forum began in 2004 with an exploration of the Alaska Constitution, a rich example of the modern creation of government. While the drafting of the U.S. Constitution may seem part of the distant past, Alaska's experience in designing its own founding document remains fresh in many minds. Young Alaskans can still talk with members of the State's Constitutional Convention of 1955 and 1956, the event that set the groundwork for statehood in 1959. Alaska's story not only reveals self-determination in action, but sheds light on America's larger story.
